
# INVESTING IN WOMEN'S EDUCATION QUARTERLY REPORT | Q2 2025

## ISA MEMBER FEATURE | 2025 Q2 Update

Theingi, a social science postgraduate student from Myanmar, is on a mission to create meaningful change by supporting marginalised communities in gaining inclusive access to land and natural resources. She previously worked with Oxfam Myanmar, focusing on Natural Resource Management, Land, and Gender, where she supported 15 civil society organisations and collaborated with 4 consortium partners in Sagaing Region, Kachin State, and Shan State. Her work revealed the deep-rooted challenges that marginalised groups, particularly ethnic minorities and women, face due to unjust land policies and weak governance. Experiencing these inequities firsthand inspired her to pursue a more strategic role in reforming land and natural resource governance in Myanmar.

To deepen her knowledge and broaden her impact, Theingi enrolled in the <u>Master of Arts in Social Science, Development Studies programme</u> at Chiang Mai University in Thailand. Her first year was supported by the USAID Burma Diversity and Inclusion Scholarship. However, due to political changes, this funding was unexpectedly terminated. Facing financial uncertainty and the devaluation of currency in Myanmar, Theingi turned to <u>Wedu's Income Sharing Agreement</u>. With this support, she has been able to continue her studies and take part in leadership development opportunities that go beyond financial support. The experience has not only helped her stay on track academically but also enabled her to build networks and develop the skills necessary to lead change in Myanmar in the future.

Theingi envisions a Myanmar where land governance systems are fair, inclusive, and protective of the rights of all communities. After graduation, she aims to take on a leadership role focused on land and natural resource governance and sustainable development. She plans to work closely with civil society organisations, academics, and local decision-makers to promote participatory governance, strengthen civil society, and ensure that vulnerable communities have a voice in policymaking processes. Theingi believes that education is a powerful tool for women to take leadership roles, influence equitable policies, and drive positive change. Through her work and leadership, she is committed to building a more just, inclusive, and sustainable future for her country.

Wedu's ISA is more than just financial support; it's a pathway to mentorship, networks, leadership development, and practical skills.

I chose it not only to continue my education, but to grow the tools and connections needed to create lasting change in Myanmar's marginalised communities. Each part of the experience has strengthened my journey as a sustainable development leader.
